#### Slow Cooker Chicken Tacos

In honor of the recent Cinco de Mayo holiday, we wanted to bring you an easy and healthy twist on classic chicken tacos! This recipe is found on SkinnyTaste.com.

Prep: 2 mins Cook: 4 hrs Total: 4 hrs 2 mins

#### Ingredients

Chicken

- 1-1/2 lbs boneless skinless chicken breast
- · adobo seasoning, or salt to taste
- 1/4 tsp garlic powder
- 3/4 tsp ground cumin
- 1 cup chunky mild or medium salsa

Tacos

- 1 cup shredded red cabbage
- juice of 1/2 lime
- 1/4 cup chopped cilantro
- 1/4 tsp kosher salt
- 6 oz from 1 medium haas avocado, sliced
- lime wedges for squeezing
- 12 corn tortillas

#### Instructions

Season the chicken with adobo (or salt), then place in the crock pot and top with garlic powder and cumin. Top chicken with salsa (no water needed).

Cover and cook on LOW for 4 to 6 hours, until chicken shreds easily.

When cooked, drain excess liquid from the pot keeping as much as the tomato sauce as possible and shred with two forks. Cover and keep warm until ready to eat.

Make the slaw: combine cabbage, lime juice, cilantro and salt in a bowl and toss.

Heat the tortillas about 30 seconds on each side over the flame of your stove until slightly charred, transfer to a plate with a towel on top to keep warm and repeat with the remaining tortillas.

To serve, place 3 tortillas on each plate, top with chicken, slaw, sliced avocado and serve with lime wedges.

#### **Mark Up Drawings**

The Drawings module is where you find all the most current (and previous) drawings for a project. There are several mark up tools available in this module. You can hyperlink RFIs, cloud areas, pull dimensions, draw/highlight on the sheet, place arrows, text boxes and place punch pins for the Punchlist.

When you open a drawing sheet, one of the icons on the top right-hand side is "Markup." When you click on this, it brings up your options on a tool bar on the left side of the screen. Each markup has several options apart from text boxes. These can be very handy tools to use through the course of construction. When you make a markup on your drawing, a box will pop up



that has three options: "Publish", "Attach" and "Trash." If you want to be the only one who sees this markup, click out of the markup and it will only show up on your log in. If you want everyone to be able to see it, you need to click the "Publish" button above the markup. If you want to attach something to that markup, such as an RFI link, you can click the "attach/paperclip icon" and select what you want to attach. If you made a mistake, you can always click the "Trash Can" and it will delete the markup.

Note that all markups done by Chambers in Procore should be done in blue. This differentiates the markups done by the architect, which are typically in red.

#### **Hot Work**

Hot work is when you are working with any open flame like welding, torching, brazing and cutting. It also includes any spark-producing power tools, such as grinders, flame heating and soldering. These tools and activities are common sources of ignition.

Hot work that is not controlled, or that is poorly managed, can have serious consequences such as injuries to workers or property damage due to fire, delays in project completion and damage to a company's reputation. Several issues that are associated with poorly managed hot work include:

- Inadequate implementation of a hot work permitting program
- Failure to identify potential fire exposures in the area
- Neglecting to provide and inspect fire extinguishing equipment
- Not enough training
- Insufficient fire monitoring after completion of hot work.

Hot work permits should be required from the first day of the construction project to the day of its completion. Fire hazards in the early parts of the construction may be minimal, but conditions can change very fast. The permit should state key information on the activity, safe work practices, company contacts, fire watches and date/ time. The permits should only be valid for one shift. The general contractor is usually in charge of assigning the PAI (Permit Authorizing Individual). They are responsible for managing and administering hot work permits onsite.

#### **Reducing the Risks**

There are different actions that can be taken to help reduce possible risks involving hot work activities.

- Use or eliminate hot work through use of alternative products or materials
- Communicate hot work programs with property owners and trade personnel
- Communicate your hot work program and review and adhere to the safe work practices

#### Preparing the Area for Hot Work

Fire extinguishing equipment needs to be in the work area within 35 feet of the hot work, combustibles need



to be removed or protected with approved materials, floors must be swept, debris and trash removed and wall and floor openings covered (including duct work). When working in enclosed equipment you must clear all equipment of combustibles, de-energize and purge all flammable items.

#### **Fire Watch**

Perform fire watch during and at least 60 minutes after the completion of hot work, breaks and lunches. Make sure the person on fire watch is trained on the use of fire extinguishers. The person assigned to fire watch should not have any other duties.

## iOS Devices and Overheating

We are finally seeing the sun and the hottest time of year will soon be approaching. Here are some things to keep in mind with your electronic devices when they are out in the heat.

Allowing your devices to get too warm or cold can cause them to shut down, which preserves their functions. This can also permanently reduce the battery life. In the event that your Apple device does get too hot, you may see the screen to the right. If you see this screen, turn off your device and move it to a cooler location. Once the device cools down (approximately 15 minutes), turn it back on and it should work as normal.

#### **Tips for Keeping Your Devices Cool**

- If you are not using your device (iPad or computer), turn it off to keep the temperature down.
- If you feel your device is getting too warm, stop using it and move it to a cooler location.
- Do not leave your devices in your vehicles, especially on hot days.
- Do not leave your device in direct sunlight for long periods of time.
- During extreme heat, use your device in battery-saving mode ("Power Save").

The battery-saving mode will use the battery less and reduce how hot it gets. Keep in mind when using this mode mail fetch, Siri, background app refresh, automatic downloads and some visual effects are reduced or turned off. You can easily refresh these apps manually. Using certain features in hot conditions or direct sunlight for longer periods of time, such as GPS, may cause the device to overheat and not function correctly.

To turn on battery-saving mode on an Apple device go to: Setting > Battery > Turn on Low Power Mode.

# **Project Spotlight**

#### First Interstate Bank - Roseburg

Chambers Construction was hired to complete the construction of a new branch office for First Interstate Bank in Roseburg. Initially, the bank was looking to build in both Roseburg and Coos Bay but ultimately decided to focus on their Douglas County location. After a few months in preconstruction, we broke ground in December 2021.

The scope of the project entailed building a single-story, steel-framed, 3,266 SF branch complete with lobby, teller counter, meeting room, private offices, employee kitchen/break room, and drive-thru teller access.

A challenge the team faced during construction was long product lead times. To overcome this obstacle, we had to adjust schedules and work as a team with our subs and the owner to keep the work moving. Glass was one of the long-lead items for this project and we communicated regularly with our subcontractor and the supplier to keep things on track. Our team ended up putting in a temporary front door so that the owner could open to the public on their target date. We later came back to help install the front sliding glass doors in the building.

After eight months of construction, the project reached substantial completion in August 2022. The end result was a beautiful building – inside and out – and a happy client. Because we performed well for First Interstate Bank, they have recently hired us to do more work for them on a local branch remodel in Eugene!
